EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORTS

Minutes of the August 10, 2020 Board of Directors Meeting were approved. (MSC)

Treasurer's Report – Jack Bolton

We are finishing the year with \$4200 in our checking account and \$10,000 in savings. We started 2020 with \$2500 in our checking account so we are ending the year in better shape. At the beginning of the year, we anticipated dipping into our savings account but we did not have to thanks to a hugely successful garden tour, the plant sale which generated some income despite being cancelled and, therefore, incurred no expenses, and our reduction in expenses due to the cancellation of in-person meetings.

Membership – February was our last in-person meeting. As most people renew at our meetings, our membership has been down for the year. Typically, we have just under 200 members. A \$15 fee does not seem significant but with 200 members it generates nearly \$3,000 which covers our scholarships. Currently, we have 166 members, 9 are free trainee members and 157 are paid members.

The 2021 membership form is on the website. It would be good to attach a copy of membership form and paragraph in next few emails.

There was some discussion about paying dues online. Dues may have to be \$16 online instead of \$15 to cover fees. Lynda Pollock, our 2021 President, will recruit the chair for membership committee and refer the matter to them and the Website Committee.

Vice President's Report - Lynda Pollock

The Executive Committee is established for 2021. Lynda Pollock will be President. Margaret Molyson will be Vice-President. Karen McGinty will be Secretary. Jack Bolton will serve again as Treasurer and Virginia Schofield will be Past-President.

Sam Landes will speak at the January 2021 meeting on mushrooms. He is open to topics he should cover for us.

#### President's Report - Virginia Schofield

I do appreciate everybody's help and support. It has been a year of challenges.

In September, we had an opportunity to support an outdoor classroom for the Paul Duke STEM high school in Peachtree Corners/Norcross, a \$100 donation for a table with our logo. We have received a thank you letter from the principle. Students built the table. We have been invited to tour space. This was an excellent opportunity to support an area (Peachtree Corners/Norcross) where we wanted to have an impact.

Our non-profit corporation status is still pending. It will have to be refiled because dates are outdated, and the signatures need to be witnessed. Perhaps this can be addressed at the same time the new Executive Committee members go to the bank for new signature cards.

#### Past-President's Report – Wes Nettleton

Wes is finishing his 5<sup>th</sup> year on Executive Committee.

#### EXTENSION REPORTS

##### Tim Daly

Thank you for all the good work despite the crazy circumstances with COVID-19. I sent an email today to Master Gardeners to make sure their volunteer hours are recorded in the MG Log. Gwinnett Master Gardeners are one of 3 counties in the state with the highest numbers, 7,000 hours.

The Master Gardener training for 2021 is tentatively scheduled for next fall. We hope to have a Master Naturalist class next fall. The application period will be sometime next summer. There are also UGA Extension evening classes on the website. We may try to hold a course for the Journeyman Farmers Certificate, but it is hard to plan with unpredictable future. Stay safe.

##### Lisa Klein

The Master Gardener Training course will start after Labor Day. Applications will be accepted after first week of May, Extension will make a selection by end of May, then we will start the process of background checks. The classes will be held in conjunction with Cobb and DeKalb at the Extension Office in DeKalb.

Kim Fritz will host a teacher Master Gardeners class online in June with four labs. That would also open up the course to those who are still working.

The Awards Ceremony was virtually held. All the certificates will be mailed. We hope to have 2021 Awards at an in-person meeting on Wednesday, May 19.

Our 2020 trainee class will receive T-shirts. They may also offer shirts to current Master Gardeners for purchase separately.

We plan to have a Drive-Through Plant Sale and will need help unloading and pulling orders. That way we will only need a skeleton crew the day of the sale. There is a great demand for native azaleas and Lisa has found a nursery that supplies only native azaleas, many varieties of native azaleas.

Harvest Gwinnett – Our County Community Gardens. Lisa will help gardeners who are leasing plots. There are three gardens at Graves, Lenora and Lawrenceville. They plan to add six more including one at Vines. They are in desperate need of help from Master Gardeners to come help weed and water the community beds. Any produce will be donated for the food insecure. Anyone can to help, not just Master Gardeners. Brandon See currently overseeing.

Many Garden clubs would like to hold online meetings. If anyone is interested in volunteering, let Lisa know.

#### Kim Fritz

The Teacher Master Gardeners Course will be held in June, which may prove difficult to get background screenings, February through April 15.

We currently have 16 graduates of Teacher MGEV training. Three have started projects. We currently have 25 total school projects – 8 food gardens, 4 ornamental gardens, 2 pollinator gardens, and 10 are a combination of gardens. We started a greenhouse project at Wesleyan school in Peachtree Corner. More opportunities are trickling in. There are three new volunteer opportunities for a pollinator gardens at Berkley Lake Elementary. Barbara Geier and Margaret Bergeron will help with that project. At Riverside in Suwanee 9 Girl Scouts are building a nature trail for their silver award. We also want to create indoor and outdoor gardens for special needs children. There is a concern about garden projects that lay fallow so we are scheduling workdays for adults only as a safeguard response to COVID-19. There is also virtual programming outside school hours.

Kim could use help with finding new grants. Also, the Army Corp of Engineers needs help at Lake Lanier with a pollinator garden.
